Historical Context

- Practiced for millennium by Indigenous People
- Recognition of place, history, authority
- Still practiced today amongst Indigenous people
- Dispels the narrative that Canada is founded on French and English
- Recognition of diversity of Indigenous people, not a homogenous group
- Some areas have more than one Indigenous group who share the area

Best Practices

- Reconcili-action
- Reverses Erasure
- Mature as a society to not marginalize Indigenous people
- Celebrate our collective history
- Recognition of Canada's attempt to eradicate Indigenous languages and cultures
- Gratitude for where we work, live, and play
- Begin all occasions with formal recognition

Ways to Celebrate Culture

- Acknowledge all First Nations who have a stated interest in the area
- le) the City of Vancouver is within the shared territories of the Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleilwaututh Nations
- Authenticity in visible presence
- Ie) showcase the local artforms, language, and place names

Ways to acknowledge

- All literature can have an acknowledgement of place
- Plaques in entranceways, or high visibility locations
- Monumental art such as welcome figures

- Use traditional names for geographic locations
- Embrace principles of the United Nations Declaration of Indigenous People
- Implement the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action

Reconcili-action

- BOMA BC can demonstrate they are progressive in actualizing reconciliation
- Tangible actions that embrace a sense of belonging
- Many organizations are implementing Land Acknowledgements to correct injustices imposed upon Indigenous Peoples
- A deep sense of justice in revitalizing ancient cultures connected to these lands
- For centuries, Indigenous people have been alienated and marginalized from their homelands
